Speakers

Uwe Ewald, former Head of Neonatology at Uppsala University Hospital, Sweden, led the department for 25 years with a focus on family-centred care and zero separation. His research includes quality-improvement initiatives in Vietnam, Nepal and Poland. He will open the seminar with an introduction to the day's theme: birth asphyxia.

Sudhin Thayyil, Professor of Perinatal Neuroscience and Director of the Centre for Perinatal Neuroscience at Imperial College London, focuses on hypoxic-ischemic encephalopathy across high-and low-income settings. His lecture will summarise key findings from the HELIX trial, emerging results from the PREVENT study in India, machine-learning approaches to predicting HIE before labour, and novel neuroprotection strategies, including updates from the EMBRACE erythropoietin trial.

Johanna Blomgren, midwife, PhD and postdoctoral researcher at Karolinska Institutet, will discuss midwife-led interventions that promote respectful intrapartum care and optimal birth positioning to improve newborn outcomes in Uganda and Ethiopia. She will present effects on Apgar scores, neonatal transfers, early breastfeeding and skin-to-skin contact, and reflect on how these approaches can be adapted and scaled across health systems.

Anna Sand, senior consultant and PhD in Obstetrics and Gynaecology and Head of Antenatal Care at Karolinska University Hospital, will present the Safe Vacuum Initiative in Tanzania, which supports the

reintroduction of vacuum extraction to reduce caesarean sections and improve maternal and neonatal outcomes.

Ashish KC, perinatal epidemiologist and Associate Professor in global health, has co-led trials and quality improvement projects across the whole maternal, neonatal and child health continuum in South Asia and, East Africa, and contributed to various multi-country implementation research studies. Here he will present some of the challenges involved when conducting multifaceted quality improvement studies in low- and middle-income settings.

Thomas Brune, paediatrician and neonatologist and former Hospital Director of the Paediatric Hospital of Luang Prabang, Lao PDR, will present outcomes from a five-day workshop designed to strengthen collaboration between obstetric and neonatal teams across three major provincial hospitals in Laos.

Maria Örtqvist, physiotherapist and Associate Professor, will explore the early detection of motor disabilities and physiotherapeutic interventions increasingly used in high-resource settings, and how these practices can be adapted and evaluated in low- and middle-income contexts.

Nick Brown, paediatrician, epidemiologist and Editor-in-Chief of *Archives of Disease in Childhood*, works clinically, academically and editorially across three continents. His interactive session will support participants in strengthening trial design for studies in peripartum care.
